

Day 1 - Brisbane to Noosa

After the pickup of your new adventure home on wheels, give yourself some time to get familiar with the vehicle before

leaving the depot. Leave Brisbane and head direction north to the Sunshine Coast on the Bruce Highway.

You will pass several small beach communities like Coolum Beach if you chose to use the seaside roads.

You can stop at the famous Australia Zoo just outside of Caloundra, which used to be home to the legendary

crocodile hunter Steve Irwin.

Distance: 145 km, 2 hours

Stay: Noosa Bougainvillia Holiday Park or the YHA Hostel provides campervan parking

Day 2 - Noosa

With a laidback vibe this sub-tropical paradise invites for a stroll in Hastings Street with elegant boutiques,

bistros and beachfront apartments. If you want more than just shopping head out into the beautiful National Parks,

hire a kayak and explore the Everglades or just grab a surfboard and head to the beautiful beaches.

Day 3 - Noosa to Rainbow Beach

On the way to Rainbow Beach take a quick 40 km detour to Tin Can Bay, a small settlement with a attraction

hardly known to tourists. Stop at the little cafe at the ocean, order a cappuccino or a cup of tea and a bucket of fish.

That's right, it is one of the few places where you actually can feed wild living dolphins while you enjoy your breakfast.

When you arrive in Rainbow Beach, it seems like there is not much, but it is one of the places to start your awesome

4WD drive adventure on the world's largest sand island: Fraser Island.

Distance: 138 km, 2 hours

Stay: Rainbow Beach Holiday Village, Fraser's on Rainbow, Dingos



Day 4 - Fraser Adventure

Several tour operators use Rainbow Beach as start and finish point for their tours for a simple reason, it is just a stone throw away.

You can chose between guided 1 day tours or a full on self drive adventure up to 3 days. Just please, don't try to use your camper...

Day 5 - Fraser to Agnes Water/ Town of 1770

Enjoy the cruise towards the next destination: Agnes Water/ Town of 1770. On the way you can stop at several places

like Hervey Bay and Bundaberg. Hervey Bay is one of the other places to head on to Fraser Islands and in whale season,

from late July to November, several whale watching tours depart from this little town.

On your journey you will pass Bundaberg, famous for its rum distillery, and Mon Repos. Mon Repos Conservation Park

is the largest loggerhead turtle rookery in the South Pacific and the turtles come ashore from November to March.

Distance: 362 km, 5 hours

Stay: 1770 Camping Ground

Day 6 - Agnes Water/ Town of 1770

This 2 settlement township got his name from Capt. James Cook, which set foot on this beautiful beach in 1770.

After you settle down in this laidback, sleepy town you easily can understand why he came here in the first place.

If you never tried surfing before, this is the last spot on your way north to give it a go. Further north the Great Barrier Reef

stops the swell and there are no more options to get the surfboard pictures for your facebook album.

In the afternoon we recommend to join the only biker gang left in Queensland and to ride your own mini 'Harley' style chopper.

Day 6 - Agnes Water/ Town of 1770 to Airlie Beach

After the relaxing day(s) start your engine and head to Airlie Beach.

On this 700 km stretch you find a lot of places to stop, relax and brake up the long ride. If you are interested in some

beautiful, untouched nature we can recommend to stop at Emu Park, north of Gladstone. Another good option is the Eungella National Park, just north-west of Mackay. Bushwalking is great at Eungella,

with more than 20 kilometres of walking tracks, scenic lookouts and interesting plants and animals.

From the viewing platform at Broken River visitors often see platypus diving to feed.

Distance: 707 km, 8.5 hours

Stay: Nomads Camper Ground, BIG4 Airlie Cove Resort

Day 7 - Airlie Beach

The Whitsundays region is famous for its beautiful islands and the Great Barrier Reef around the globe.

Here two World Heritage areas, the Great Barrier Reef and Wet Tropics Rainforest form a natural environment

and skydiving to an indulgent tropical escape on the beach and the Great Barrier Reef.

Day 10 - Mission Beach to Cape Tribulation

If you brought some time for your adventure trip we recommend to turn off the highway at Innisfall and to drive around

Cairns through the Atherton Tablelands. The winding roads in these highlands passing the spectacular

Josephine and Dinner Falls, the Crawfords Lookout, a platypus viewing platform and the refreshing lake Eacham.

Distance: 320 km, 5 hours

Stay: Cape Tribulation Camping Ground

Day 11 - Cape Tribulation

From the moment you arrive in this breathtaking paradise you will feel the magic, to be in the oldest living rainforest

in the world and to spot the Great Barrier Reef from underneath the forest canopy . Enjoy a river cruise on the Daintree River

and spot the resident crocodiles that inhabit the area. Hike along the rainforest walk to the stunning views of the Alexandra Lookout

and meet the indigenous locals at Mossman George. The fascinating beauty of the thick, untouched rainforest and the sandy,

white beaches invites you to yet another memorable evening with your travel mates and a BBQ in your home on wheels.



Day 11 - Cape Tribulation to Cairns

Spend a leisurely day driving down the cost on the last stretch to the finishing line in Cairns. Take in the views of more stunning beaches, beautiful Rainforest and Port Douglas. Your epic journey ends in the relaxed tourist town Cairns.
